Borrego 1 **ORDINANCE** 2 **AMENDING SECTION 9-8-99 ROA 1994 and SECTION 8-2-1-60 ROA 1994 TO** 3 ADD OR INCREASE THE AMOUNT OF A FINE ASSOCIATED WITH A 4 LITTERING OFFENSE. 5 WHEREAS, neighborhood states have taken littering and its effect on the 6 environment very seriously and consequently have attached fines and/or jail 7 sentences for littering; and 8 WHEREAS, in the State of Arizona the law defines "criminal littering or 9 polluting" when "a person throws, places, drops or permits to be dropped on 10 public property or property of another that is not a lawful dump any litter. 11 destructive or injurious material that the person does not immediately Bracketed/Underscored Material] - New 12 remove." Littering can cost drivers and their passengers fines, plus court [Bracketed/Strikethrough Material] -13 costs, ranging from \$460 to \$1,000 and a charge of a class 2 misdemeanor; 14 and 15 WHEREAS, in the State of Colorado, discarding a lighted cigarette on a 16 public roadway can lead to a 3 to twelve month jail sentence under a class 2 17 misdemeanor and a substantial fine from \$250 to \$1000 and penalties for 18 littering range from \$150 to \$999; and 19 WHEREAS, litter harms our land, roadways, right of ways, water and quality 20 of life, and poses significant costs to all citizens to cleanup and remove; and 21 WHEREAS, the protection of New Mexico's scarce water resources from 22 harmful toxins and pollutants such as dog waste, plastic and dye toxins, and 23 total undissolved suspended particulate and dissolved water particulate 24 matter is a priority for the state and local municipalities and their economies;

1	WHEREAS, litter discarded in the streets and parks can travel through the
2	storm water system and cause harm to wildlife and humans; and
3	WHEREAS, litter attracts vermin and is a breeding ground for bacteria; and
4	WHEREAS, the biggest source of litter is cigarette butts which contain
5	harmful chemicals, including arsenic, that can contaminate water and soil and
6	can start fires if they are discarded improperly or unextinguished; and
7	WHEREAS, litter can create safety problems such as broken glass bottles
8	and metal cans that can injure people who step or fall on them; and
9	WHEREAS, animal and human waste left on public streets and in parks
10	contribute to harmful bacteria and may cause outbreaks of highly contagious
11	diseases, such as, Hepatitis A that attacks the human liver; and
12	WHEREAS, Albuquerque citizens, their children and future generations
13	have a right to live in a clean, safe, and healthy community; and
14	WHEREAS, Albuquerque's climate and clean air are renowned throughout
15	the world and contribute to its beauty and distinctiveness; and
16	WHEREAS, the City of Albuquerque's neighboring and natural amenities
17	such as public farmlands, the Rio Grande Bosque, Sandia foothills trail
18	systems, and the acequia waterways and storm-water canals are integral to
19	the population's experience of the City and quality of life and benefit from
20	protection from careless disposal of waste; and
21	WHEREAS, Albuquerque's citizens demonstrate respect and pride for the
22	beautiful and rare qualities of Albuquerque by refraining from improper trash
23	disposal, and thereby share the City's unblemished and unique qualities with
24	visitors who channel dollars into the local economy; and
25	WHEREAS, Albuquerque's environmental legacy is dependent on us all to
26	contribute to its preservation through community beautification projects,
27	recycling, illegal dumping prevention and litter control; and
28	WHEREAS, at the same time, the Albuquerque Weed and Anti-Litter
29	Ordinance is designed in part to help promote community health, safety, and
30	welfare and to otherwise abate or prevent the development of nuisances, to
31	promote community aesthetics and pride, and to prevent health and safety
32	risks that could result from the accumulation of weeds and litter.

1	BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL, THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY O)F
2	ALBUQUERQUE:	

SECTION 1. Section 9-8-99 ROA 1994, the penalty provisions of the Albuquerque Weed and Anti-Litter Ordinance, is amended as follows:

"
\$ 9-8-99 PENALTY.

- (A) Any person who violates any of the provisions of this article, excluding § 9-8-32, shall be deemed guilty of a petty misdemeanor and, upon conviction thereof, shall be subject to the penalty provisions set forth in § 1-1-99 of this code of ordinances to include a minimum fine of \$250. Any person deemed guilty of a subsequent violation shall be subject to a minimum fine of \$350 and then \$500 for each violation thereafter. Community service may be imposed in lieu of or in addition to any such fine. Every violation shall be a separate misdemeanor.
- (B) Any person who violates the provisions of § 9-8-32 regarding smoking tobacco product litter shall be subject to the penalty provisions set forth in § 1-1-99 of this code of ordinances to include a minimum fine of \$250. Any person deemed guilty of a subsequent violation of § 9-8-32 shall be subject to a minimum fine of \$500 for each violation thereafter."
- SECTION 2. Section 8-2-1-60 ROA 1994, the littering provision within the Albuquerque Traffic Code, is amended to change the penalty for a littering offense as follows:

"§ 8-2-1-60 LITTERING.

It shall be unlawful for any occupant of any motor vehicle, bicyclist, pedestrian or any other person on a roadway, to dispose or discard refuse on any roadway in any manner other than by placing the refuse in a receptacle provided for the purpose by responsible governmental authorities. Any person who violates the provisions of this section shall be subject to the penalty provisions of § 9-8-99."

SECTION 3. SEVERABILITY CLAUSE. If any section, paragraph, sentence, clause, word or phrase of this ordinance is for any reason held to be invalid or unenforceable by any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining provisions of this ordinance. The Council hereby declares that it would have passed this ordinance and each section,
